ABOUT THE SHOW

Two people meet online as young teenagers and begin an intense friendship that transcends changes and updates in technology. As they move through their lives into young adulthood they help each other find the confidence to be their true selves and support each other through turbulent and uncertain times. They laugh together, learn, fall out, frustrate each other, make up and eventually develop their unbreakable bond into a lifelong relationship.

Tabby Lamb (she/they), writer, said: "I started writing Happy Meal during lockdown, when trans people were more often than not isolating alone or in unsupportive environments. This is a play about trans people by trans people and for trans people - a celebration of everything that makes us powerful!"

Steven Atkinson (he/him), producer for Roots, said: "As theatre is returning to live performance, we think it's the perfect time to celebrate trans lives with Tabby's hopeful new play about how the internet and the real world can be a joyful queer space that accepts the rights and freedoms for all people to be who they are. For Roots to be touring our first show to Australia in co-production with Theatre Royal Plymouth, shows such positive action from leaders within the theatre industry to platform trans artists and promote inclusive queer stories. "

James Mackenzie-Blackman (he/him), Chief Executive of Theatre Royal Plymouth, said: "I'm delighted that Happy Meal will be made with TRP. We're at an important moment of change. I'm committed to opening our programme to include more voices, more perspectives and more theatre that connects to more people in our city and region. 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A NOTE FROM THE WRITER

This play was inspired by three people.

Number One is my dear friend Nicol who once turned to me and said, "you were born in exactly the right body". This sentence is what prompted me to begin creating a world where lines like this are normal.

Number Two is my fiancé, my very own Alec, who every single day inspires me to be the very best version of me possible – for myself, for them and for our community. I've rarely met anyone as kind or as caring, and I hope one day to be as good a person as they are.

Number Three is my fiancé's father, who passed away just before rehearsals began. Doug created the person I love the most in the world, embraced his weird future daughter-in-law, and in fact he was the very first person to call me 'daughter'. I learnt so much from him, from the fact that a single Star Wars film is not called a Star War, to how to be myself at any age, and how it's never too late to stop learning and growing. I hope that Alec and Bette continue to learn, grow and develop long after the final line of this play. They deserve to live lives as full of love and happiness as Doug did.

Finally, this play is for every single trans person who wants to see themselves on stage. It's for future Alecs and Bettes, future audience members, every single one of us who put on *Maid in Manhattan* and said, "this would be better if JLo had a dick".
